Name of Creator

Correspondence related to mission work created under the oversight of the Moravian Congregation of Bethlehem, Provincial Helpers' Conference (PHC) and Provincial Elders' Conference (PEC) in North America.

Administrative/Biographical History

Moravians first arrived in Colonial America (Savannah, Georgia) in 1735 with one of their major initiatives to establish a mission to Native Americans living in the vicinity of Savannah. After Moravians resettled in Pennsylvania's Lehigh Valley in the early 1740s, missionary activities ultimately ensued among the Delaware and other Native American groups. Moravian missionaries followed the Delaware in particular westward from Pennsylvania to Ohio, to Canada, Indiana, and finally to Kansas. Moravian missionaries also worked among Mahicans in New York and Connecticut, and among the Cherokee in modern-day Georgia and Oklahoma. Mission work among Native Americans lasted until the year 1900.

John Gottlieb Ernestus Heckewelder (1743-1823) was a Moravian missionary to the Delaware Indians in western Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, and Canada from 1762 until his retirement in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania in 1810. He was born to Moravian parents in Bedford, England and educated in Moravian schools at Buttermere and Fulneck until the family moved to Bethlehem in 1754. His parents were later called to mission service in the West Indies while John remained in Bethlehem and apprenticed as a cooper until 1762, when he accompanied the Moravian missionary Christian Friedrich Post on a mission to relocate the Christian Delaware in western Pennsylvania to Ohio. In 1771 he became the assistant of another Moravian missionary, David Zeisberger, with whom he worked for the next fifteen years with Christian Native Americans in various settlements in western Pennsylvania, Ohio and Michigan as their communities were pushed further westward. During this time, Heckewelder became fluent in the Delaware language and customs, consequently being asked to serve as an ambassador for the American government on various peace treaty negotiations with Native American tribes during the 1790s. In 1810, Heckewelder and his family retired to Bethlehem, where he wrote definitive works on Native American culture and language, and served as a member of the American Philosophical Society until his death in 1823.

Archival History

The Letters to John Heckewelder record group is an artificial collection, a collection of letters with unknown provenance assembled and organized to facilitate its management or use. At this time, it is not clear how and when these letters came to be deposited at MHS. In the past, it seems that the collection was organized at the item level by staff or volunteers according to general subject matter, and then numbered sequentially and placed into boxes according to subject. The collection was digitized with its current numbering system over a number of years, with digitization completed in 2023. In order to improve accessibility and enhance descriptions, Lanie Yaswinski was hired in August 2023 to edit the database entries and create finding aids for these digitized collections.

Scope and Content

This collection contains letters written to the Moravian missionary John Heckwelder as he served in various Native American mission communities between 1779-1806, along with letters he received in retirement in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania between 1812-1820 from Moravian missionary Abraham Luckenbach stationed in Goshen, Ohio.

System of Arrangement

The records were previously organized at the item level, according to general subject groups. Since the records were digitized with a sequential numbering system, the physical system of arrangement remains intact. To improve accessibility and establish intellectual control over the subject group, records are organized chronologically in the finding aid.
