The Moravian Historical Society



Founded in 1857, the Moravian Historical Society (MHS) shares the fascinating story of the Moravians through public programs, guided tours, publications, and engaging museum exhibits. More than 20,000 objects illustrate the Moravians' contributions to religion, industry,

education, music, and art. Highlights of the collection include

paintings by John Valentine Haidt (1700-1780), whose biblical scenes are among the earliest known to be painted in colonial America. MHS has a significant collection of early musical instruments, many of which represent the first of their kind made in America, including the 1759 Antes violin, the c. 1745–1765 upright piano, and the 1761 Tannenberg clavichord. These treasures demonstrate the inception and development of musical instrument making in America. Our historic site includes two eighteenth century structures: the 1740-1743 Whitefield House and the 1740 Gray Cottage, the oldest surviving Moravian structure in North America.

Our Mission

The Moravian Historical Society museum and historic site preserves, interprets, and celebrates the rich culture of the Moravians.

Our Vision

The Moravian Historical Society is recognized broadly for its significant collection and historically important eighteenth century site. Intellectually vibrant, we commit to sharing the stories of the Moravians and their remarkable contributions to history that continue to shape our culture.

The Museum welcomes visitors seven days a week, year-round. MHS maintains an ambitious schedule of educational programs, including concerts, lectures, tours, and a summer camp.

MHS is committed to supporting the principles of diversity, equity, accessibility, and inclusion throughout the Museum as an institution where people work, volunteer, and gather. We are dedicated to expanding access and creating a welcoming environment for everyone.

Land Acknowledgement

We recognize and acknowledge that the Moravian Historical Society stands on Lenapehoking, the traditional homelands of the Lenape, also called the Delaware Nation. The Lenape are the Indigenous people of the lands we now call eastern Pennsylvania, New Jersey, Delaware, and parts of New York, Maryland, and Connecticut since time immemorial. The Lenape were historically removed from their homelands because of centuries of settler colonialism, so their tribal governments and a majority of Lenape citizens are now located outside of their ancestral homelands. But they have maintained their tribal sovereignty and ongoing cultural relationships to their homelands. Today's federally recognized Lenape tribal nations are Delaware Nation (Anadarko, Oklahoma); Delaware Tribe of Indians (Bartlesville, Oklahoma); the Stockbridge Munsee Community (Bowler, Wisconsin); and the Munsee Delaware Nation and the Eelūnaapèewii Lahkèewiit (Delaware Nation at Moraviantown), both in Ontario, Canada.

A Year to Celebrate





It's inspiring to reflect on all that the staff and volunteers accomplished this year. The words, pictures and numbers in this report tell stories of a lively, productive year. This annual report to you, our members, donors, and supporters, shares the impact of the vital work that you helped make possible. With your support, the Moravian Historical Society brought to life three special exhibitions, produced nine music and lecture events, delivered two weeks of Hands-On History Camp, and hosted the community during two large outdoor festivals. All these activities brought new visitors to our historic site to learn about the rich heritage of the Moravians.

There is also much work that goes on behind the scenes. This past year, we have been devoted to making our collections more accessible. Building on a recent effort to digitize archival documents, we are now creating finding aids to help researchers better understand our archival holdings and connect our collection to other organizations.

We are also devoted to preserving our collection, including our historic structures. Approaching their 300th year, these historic buildings have remarkable significance. Our museum is home to some of America's rarest treasures, illustrating the Moravians' contributions to industry, education, music, and art. I am proud that our current Strategic Planning Committee has placed the preservation of our buildings and collections as its primary focus.

Critical initiatives behind the scenes also included collaborations with Tribal partners to care for our Native American collection with a deeper understanding, sensitivity, and respect. We are working with the Delaware Nation to comply with the Federal law known as the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA). This process has been immensely rewarding and has resulted in new partnerships with members of the federally recognized Lenape people, including the Delaware Nation, the Delaware Tribe of Indians, and the Stockbridge Munsee Community.

The Moravian community is celebrating the recent inscription of four eighteenth century Moravian Church settlements to World Heritage status by UNESCO. Herrnhut (Germany), Bethlehem (USA), Gracehill (N. Ireland), and Christiansfeld (Denmark; inscribed in 2015) were deemed to be of outstanding value for humanity. This designation is the first transnational World Heritage listing in the United States, highlighting the international scope of the Moravian Church and its missions.

Our museum celebrates this international Moravian history through its remarkable global collection, which we share with visitors through our guided museum tours, programs, publications, and events. We could not do this work without you! With your ongoing involvement, we are excited to expand our programs, deepen our community engagement, and continue to celebrate the rich culture of the Moravians.



Collections



Acquisition Highlights

The Moravian Historical Society received 60 donations this year from nine donors that enrich and expand our collections, including objects related to Nazareth Hall, 18 objects related to the history of Moravians in Ohio, and objects related to early life and trades in Nazareth.

This year, the installation of new lighting for the permanent exhibition space and the third-floor storage areas improved the safety of collection areas. All the storage areas and the attic have new LED light fixtures, and the four tall cases and the wall case in the second-floor galleries have new interior lighting with dimmer switches. The new lighting will help preserve the collection by bringing lumens into the correct range. This was funded, in part, by the Northampton County GrowNORCO grant. We have also installed three listening stations in the galleries which invite visitors to hear recordings of the Tannenberg organ, the upright piano, and the serpent.

Museum and Site

A 2023 Collections Assessment for Preservation (CAP) report identified the critical need for a dehumidification system in the basement of the Whitefield House. The support beams in the basement of the historic structure are showing signs of deterioration due to high humidity levels. High humidity also provides the ideal environment for pests such as powder-post beetles to thrive. Thank you to the Nazareth Rotary Club for a grant to install dehumidifiers. The system is mitigating prior damage and will help preserve one of the region's most significant historic structures for years to come.

Exhibitions



In March, we opened the special exhibition, *Grounds for Meditation: Moravian Pleasure Gardens*, curated by Farrar Lannon. The exhibit explores the international influences which the Moravians brought together to create their own distinct landscapes and pleasure gardens in Europe and Pennsylvania. Through collected reminiscences and first-hand observations made by visitors to these early parks, the exhibit describes varied historic landscapes that are no longer possible to see and experience.

This year's putz display, *A Folk Art Masterpiece: The Jennie Trein Putz*, featured a collection of Jenny Trein's (1879-1977) pieces in the 1740 Gray Cottage. Trein, a folk artist from Nazareth, Pennsylvania, made her very first putz in 1908, and continued every year for six decades. Nearly 500 pieces, mostly handmade, were part of the holiday season for generations of Nazareth residents.

The Moravian Historical Society hosted the Lehigh Valley Embroiderers' Guild of America (LVEGA) exhibition, *Stitch by Stitch: Celebrating 45 years of the Lehigh Valley Embroiderers' Guild.*

Education

History comes to life here

The Moravian Historical Society hosted its popular Hands-On History camp on our historic site. Students eight to twelve years old began their summer vacation immersed in history. The objects in our museum inspired this year's theme, "Camp Colonial." Camp activities explored colonial life, music, crafts, architecture, and games. Campers learned from scholars and professionals while learning about colonial crafts, trades, and daily life.

17th Annual Share the Heritage Gala


