Name of Creator

Mission records created under the oversight of the Moravian Congregation of Bethlehem, Provincial Helpers' Conference (PHC) and Provincial Elders' Conference (PEC) in North America.

Administrative/Biographical History

Moravians first arrived in Colonial America (Savannah, Georgia) in 1735 with one of their major initiatives to establish a mission to Native Americans living in the vicinity of Savannah. After Moravians resettled in Pennsylvania's Lehigh Valley in the early 1740s, missionary activities ultimately ensued among the Delaware and other Native American groups. Moravian missionaries followed the Delaware in particular westward from Pennsylvania to Ohio, to Canada, Indiana, and finally to Kansas. Moravian missionaries also worked among Mahicans in New York and Connecticut, and among the Cherokee in modern-day Georgia and Oklahoma. Mission work lasted until the year 1900.

In 1732, Moravians established a mission among enslaved Africans on the Caribbean island of St. Thomas. Soon Moravian missions began on other islands: St. Croix (1740), St. John (1754), Jamaica (1754), Antigua (1756), Barbados (1765), St. Kitts (1777), Tobago (1790/1827), Trinidad (1890), and the Dominican Republic (1907). In 1879, the General Synod in Herrnhut declared the Moravian work in the West Indies a mission province, with its own administration and less dependent on financial contributions from the Mission Board in Herrnhut. Soon, this large province was split into two: Jamaica was to be its own mission province, while the other islands formed the

province of the Eastern West Indies (EWI). In 1963, EWI became an independent province of the Moravian Church.

Archival History

The Moravian Missions record group is an artificial collection, a collection of materials with unknown provenance assembled and organized to facilitate its management or use. At this time, it is not clear how and when these materials came to be deposited at MHS. In the past, it seems that the collection was organized at the item level by staff or volunteers according to general subject matter, and then numbered sequentially and placed into boxes according to subject. The collection was digitized with its current numbering system over a number of years, with digitization completed in 2023. In order to improve accessibility and enhance descriptions, Lanie Yaswinski was hired in August 2023 to edit the database entries and create finding aids for these digitized collections.

Scope and Content

This bulk of this collection contains materials related to various Moravian missions among the American Indians, including community member catalogs, diaries, correspondence with missionaries, financial records, cultural notes, and translations of liturgical texts into the Delaware language. In addition, there is some correspondence and regulations related to the Moravian missions to Jamaica and the West Indies.

System of Arrangement

The records were previously organized at the item level according to general subject groups, however, during the current project, some records pertinent to the subject group were found in other boxes in the collection. Since the records were digitized with a sequential numbering system, the physical system of arrangement remains intact. To improve accessibility and establish intellectual control over the subject group, records from various boxes are combined in the finding aid and organized chronologically.
